Basic Principle of Legal Aid

- People has the right to access to justice
 - The right to fair trial
 - The right to legal assistance
- The government has obligations to
 - Guarantee fair trial
 - Guarantee the legal aid in national legal system at the highest possible level
 - Accessible
 - Effective
 - Sustainable
 - Credible

What the government can do to make it easier for pro bono

- The government should
 - Recognize and encourage the contribution of lawyer's associations, universities, civil society, groups and institutions in providing legal aid
 - □ Encourage legal and bar associations to support the provision of legal aid by offering a range of services, including those that are free (pro bono), in line with their professional calling and ethical duty.

What the government can do to make it easier for pro bono

- Enact legal aid law or regulations
- Support university legal clinics
- Support lawyer's associations, civil society organizations, local administration
- Incentives and honor i.e. tax reduction, recognition
- Protection of pro bono lawyer
- What else and how?

Role of government in pro bono

Government:

Financial: legal aid, or government funded legal representation for indigent persons

- Government should play this role
- But it's not the only role open to it

This financial role raises a question: should government take over indigent representation, so that lawyers don't have to do anything?

What problems might this raise?

Role of government in pro bono

Government:

Financial contributions: not the only role open to it

- Pro bono is matter of money and heart
- Sole emphasis on financial contributions means other opportunities not explored, and leaves out "heart"

What are other ways in which government can support access to justice?

Role of government in pro bono

Government: ways to support access to justice other than financial

- Education
- Regulation of lawyers: practicing certificate for pro bono cases?
 Professional liability for pro bono cases? Continuing legal education for pro bono cases?
- Community education: rights and responsibilities?
- Dispute mechanisms that do not require/prohibit lawyers: mediation?
 Small claims courts?
- <u>Setting example</u>: government lawyers doing pro bono? (Australia requirement of pro bono for lawyers awarded government contract work)




Lawyers in Australia

99,700 practicing lawyers in Australia


 15,326 businesses provide legal services in Australia
