



CHALLENGES

- Quality and quantity of legal aid providers.
- 1 lawyer serves 14,000 citizens
- High demand of legal aid
- Imbalance in the distribution of lawyers between city and country.
- Legal procedures are complicated
- Friendly environment has not been paid enough attention.
- Legal aid services is simple.
- Supervision and evaluation
- Others: cost of living, understanding and sharing, timing...

SOLUTIONS

- Improve the law and the legal system
- Raising legal awareness and capacity for the legal aid providers, legal aid centers
- Increase the number of lawyers and legal aid providers
- Activities/competition to recognize the legal aid achievements
- Socialization of legal aid services
- CLE law student involvement

Practical Challenges

- Stress
- Heavy workload / long working hours
- Billing targets / unsupportive employers
- High cost of living
- Lack of appropriate communication skills
- Lack of suitable legal knowledge
- Lack of language abilities besides English
- Restrictions on lawyers in offshore firms

Other Challenges

Mindset – many lawyers do not realise the need for pro bono in a place like Singapore

- Background of lawyers often privileged
 - Lack of understanding of "man on the street" issues

- Buy-in from law firms & employers
 - Need to keep lawyers happy
- Gaining your employers' trust
 - Need to keep your boss happy
 - Need to keep your job or you cannot practise!
- Learn effective time management & plan ahead

 - Senior lawyers need to set good examples
